#### DON'T PANIC - BREATHE

#### WRITE DOWN EVERYTHING THAT HAS HAPPENED

Make sure you have done the following:

- Phone the bank/ credit card company and report the fraud as soon as possible. Be aware they may need to freeze your account if its seriously compromised.
- Make a report to Action Fraud and obtain a reference number.
- Call the bank/credit card company back and give them the Action Fraud reference number.
- Call the Police and give them the details of the fraud, obtain a crime reference number.
- Call the bank/credit card company back and give them the Police crime reference number.
- Keep copies of all your contact with the fraudsters such as emails, texts, WhatsApp, Facebook messaging etc.
- Call us via Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 0808 223 1133.

## All about the bells!

#### This is an edited quote from the newsletter of our father club, the Rotary Club of Ipswich written by Editor Ian Rossiter.

In the words of that well known Parisian campanologist, Quasimodo, it is all about "the bells, the bells", or in this case "the bell what opens and closes our meetings".

When I took our bell home recently and requested the good lady wife to scrape off the verdigris and give it a good polish, we were both intrigued by what came to light. The first bit of history noted was that the bell was presented to the club by Dr HH Brown, President 1925-26.

Then, we noted that in 1973 the bell went for a perambulation and took off across the Atlantic where it was "Presented to the Rotary Club of Ipswich, Massachusetts by the Rotary Club of Ipswich, England to commemorate their joint Golden Jubilee 1923 - 73".

After a brief sojourn in the "Land of the Free" the bell returned to this side of the Pond, when it was "Returned to the Rotary Club of Ipswich England by the Rotary Club of Ipswich Massachusetts with continuing regard. 1980".

How many of us were aware of the history of our bell, how many Presidents have given it a "ding" or a "dong" and thought of the little bit of history they were at that moment a part? Now, fifty years on after departure on its transatlantic cruise, the bell is with us as an integral part of our centenary. What changes and what events has our bell seen over its life, what contributions to the community in Ipswich has it "presided" over? To what extent is our community aware of this history and of the contribution the four Rotary clubs have made to Ipswich down the years? Maybe now is a good time to increase public awareness and in doing so encourage new Rotarians to be part of our belief in "Service Above Self".

The gavel Presidents use to strike the bell is a tad younger than its partner in procedure, being only thirty-four years old, having been presented Alan Betsford, President 1988-89. But what is age but a state of mind? As they say, "old Rotarians never die" - they just move on to join the pantheon of other Rotarians such as:

Neil Armstrong, first astronaut to walk on the moon, Rotary Club of Wapakoneta;

Clarence Birdseye II, who invented a method for fast freezing food, Rotary Club of Gloucester;

Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister England, Rotary Club of London (Duke of Edinburgh too);

John F. Kennedy, US President, Rotary Club of Hyannis;

Manny Pacquiao, world boxing champion, Rotary Club of Manila;

Franklin D. Roosevelt, US President, Rotary Club of Albany;

Harlan Sanders (aka Colonel Sanders, founder of KFC), founding member of Rotary Club of Jeffersonville;

Jean Sibelius, Composer, Rotary Club of Helsinki-Helsingfors;

Guglielmo Marconi, Inventor of the wireless radio, Rotary Club of Bologna;

Sir Harry Lauder, Vaudeville comedian, Rotary Club of Glasgow; the list goes on and on.

We should be proud of Rotary and the contribution Rotarians have made and continue to make. Let us enjoy our centenary and move on to the next hundred years.

"Bröckedde's Beautiful Failures".



## The Charter Deed

Pröpke froze. He hadn't completely forgotten that RC Bröckedde had formed 60 years ago but when exactly? That wasn't mentioned in the letter. Quickly calling a crisis meeting, he asked why the Club archivist hadn't reminded them of the 60th anniversary.

"Because we haven't had an archivist for the past 10 years", remarked the Club's intellectual, Professor Dr Krümelein, "we've lost our memory".

Poor old Pröpke sat down again. The Professor had a good point; Friend Döderlein had been a meticulous archivist for years but none of the other members had shown much of an interest, so he left the Club feeling rather insulted.

"I'll have to go and eat humble pie" sighed the President and duly made an appointment with the long lost archivist. After much bowing and scraping, Döderlein took Pröpke into his cellar. "We can't ask the founding members anymore but we might find something here", he said as he pulled out a dust covered box file. And suddenly, there it was, the Charter Deed of 1963 but with a large red stain over the exact date.

"It's red wine" sighed Döderlein, "they knew how to party in those days".

Pröpke took the damaged deed home and called his fellow Rotarian, Friend Greifer, Bröckedde's Chief of Police. "No problem", he replied, "I'll give it to our lab".

A couple of days later he phoned Pröpke back with some good news and some bad. "We've identified the wine as Chateau Lafite Rothschild 1959, so our founding members had fine taste. However, its acidity has completely removed the date".

Pröpke sighed rather miserably as his dream of re-establishing the Charter Dinner on the correct date receded. Yet shortly after he had a minor stroke of genius and called one of the Club's youngest members, Friend Kwujau at his successful graphics studio and who immediately suggested a creative solution.

Not long after President Pröpke was holding a flawless version of the deed, looking suitably aged but with no trace of a wine stain.

"What about the date" asked Pröpke.

"Well, there wasn't one" replied Kwujau "so I just used my birthday, 29th February".

Invitations were duly sent out with a copy of the Charter Deed and President Pröpke set about drafting a speech that everyone would remember.

Shortly before the great event, the Professor rang saying he wasn't one to nit-pick, which of course he actually did all the time, but 1963 had not been a leap year.

For once our dear President was not to be put off, "We'll just leave it as it is" he responded, "Bröckedde has always been a bit behind the times, that's what makes us so different".
